### Yakima Public Schools See Double-Digit Growth in Graduation Rates Over Four Years

In 2019, 73.6% of students graduated in four years. In 2012 that number was 56.1%. With a trending increase from 2016-2019 of 74%, the Yakima School District as a whole (including alternative and juvenile detention schooling) is nearing the state average. In 2018, Davis High School and Eisenhower High School saw rates above the state average of 80.9% (most recent state data) with 88.7% and 84.8% respectively.

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### Priority 1 – Fix Educational Inequities

Regionalization continues to accentuate the inequities built in to the state's educational funding formulas. For the most part, it provides added funding to property rich or more affluent districts, thus discriminating against poor students and districts of poverty. Update the prototypical schools model to reflect the actual workings of Washington public schools. Establish an equitable biennial review/revision process for the prototypical school funding formula to amply meet district and student educational needs.



### Priority 2 – Student Supports

Students continue to come to school with many life challenges that impact their learning ability. For many of these students, their success is dependent on multiple supports to include: 1) The school district's ability to attract and retain high-quality staff; 2) Programmatic and staffing support to address the student social-emotional and behavioral needs 3) Health and safety supports; and 4) Support for homeless students.

#### Priority 3 - Special Education

The federal and state requirements for students being served in special education have not diminished. The state and federal funds allocated to specifically serve the needs of these students, however, do not meet the needs of those students.





Congratulations to the Yakima School District schools that were honored as State-Recognized Schools for closing gaps and demonstrating improvement among student groups identified for support. A total of five schools in the Yakima School District received this honor: A.C. Davis High School, Hoover Elementary School, McClure Elementary School, Nob Hill Elementary School, and Gilbert Elementary School.

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
