2018 Legislative Priorities

Yakima School District No. 7

As the 2018 Legislative Session nears, the members of the board of directors of the Yakima School District believe that our students will directly benefit from the following priorities:

- Priority 1: Education Funding Model Transition
- Priority 2: Capitol Funding
- Priority 3: Student Supports

<u>Priority 1 - Education Funding Model</u> Transition

The work on EHB 2242 and SSB 5883 is much appreciated. The YSD Board of Directors encourages our legislators to continue to work on refinements to those elements that have revealed unintended consequences such as 1) Local Effort Assistance (LEA) exacerbated disparities; 2) salary schedule and staff mix factor that increases disparities; and 3) Inequitable regionalization factor.



Priority 2 - Capitol Funding

Passage of the Capitol Budget is necessary for approved bond measures through our state. School districts are losing money for every day approval of a capitol budget is delayed.

Priority 3 - Student Supports

Students continue to come to school with many life challenges that impact their learning ability. For many of these students, their success is dependent on multiple supports to include: 1) The school district's ability to attract and retain high-quality staff; 2) Programmatic and staffing support to address the student social-emotional and behavioral needs; and 3) Support for homeless students.

Special Education

The federal and state requirements for students being served in special education have not diminished. The state and federal funds allocated to specifically serve the needs of these students, however, do not meet the needs of those students
